Course Description

This course is an introduction to some important issues in the philosophical domains of epistemology, metaphysics, and the philosophy of religion. In particular, we will examine philosophical discussions about the scope of human knowledge, how the mental relates to the physical, the possibility of free will, and whether it is possible to reconcile the existence of an allgood, all-powerful God with the apparent existence of evil and suffering.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Introduce students to an array of issues in epistemology, metaphysics, and philosophy of religion
- Train students to write an argumentative paper
- Provide knowledge about how historical and contemporary philosophers have argued for their positions on the respective issues.
- Provide students an opportunity to engage in constructive debate with each other.

Evaluation

- Two papers, the first 3-5 pages long (worth 20%), due in class on Tuesday, October 18th, the second 4-6 pages long (worth 25%), due in class on the last day of class (Thursday, December 8th).
- A take-home *midterm exam* (worth 20%), due in class on Tuesday, November 1st.
- A Registrar-scheduled final exam (worth 25%).

• *Tutorial* performance, which consists of frequency and quality of engagement in tutorials (worth 10%).
