#### **Course Description**

This course is a general introduction to philosophy. The class focuses on three areas of philosophy: Epistemology, Metaphysics, and Philosophy of Science. Epistemology is the study of knowledge: what knowledge is, and how we attain it. Metaphysics is the study of what exists: what the world is really like, and what objects are real. Philosophy of Science asks how science works, and what makes knowledge scientific.

**Prerequisites: None** 

#### **Course Learning Outcomes:**

Broad knowledge of philosophy, including its history, subject matter, and how it is practiced. Ability to recognize, analyze, and assess arguments. Ability to read and critically engage with primary sources.

#### **Required Text:**

First Philosophy: Fundamental Problems and Readings in Philosophy: Second Edition (2011), edited by Andrew Bailey (with Robert Martin). Broadview Press.

Writing Support Services assist with a variety of assignments, from essays to lab reports. Students can book 30-minute one-on-one appointments online, sign up for 15- minute drop-in appointments, and register for a variety of writing workshops.
