Course Description

We will begin by discussing the relation between religion and morality. Next we will examine different ideas about what is good for a person. Then we will turn to the two most influential approaches to understanding what actions are right, and their two most famous advocates—John Stuart Mill and Immanuel Kant. Then we will discuss whether morality is objective, and finally we will look at some practical issues: overpopulation, poverty, animals and euthanasia.

Course Learning Objectives:

Throughout the course you will be attempting to come to your own conclusions regarding the issues discussed by assessing arguments for and against the views presented in the readings. You will be developing your ability to comprehend, interpret, and analyse complex sources, as well as to recognise and construct convincing arguments both in writing and orally.

Required Readings:

A selection of readings from classical and contemporary sources is available under Content on D2L.

Course Requirements:

A take-home midterm due Feb 2 worth 20% of the final grade, two papers 1200-1500 words (4-5 pages) due Mar 1 and Apr 13, worth 25% of the final grade each, and a registrar-scheduled final exam, worth 30%.

Participation in class discussion in lectures and tutorials by answering questions and offering thoughts and questions of your own can increase your grade by as much as one grade step (e.g. from B- to B). Cumulative and final grades will be computed by the D2L site using the following scale:
