Course Description

For about two thirds of this course we will look at issues around sex and love including metaphysical questions (e.g. what are sex and love, what is the relation between sexual desire and identity) and value questions (e.g. sexual objectification, permissible sex, pornography, prostitution). The remaining third will look at issues surrounding death including metaphysical questions (e.g. what is death) and value questions (e.g. is death bad, would it be good to be immortal)

Course Assessment

Participation: 26%

• Participation grades will be determined on the basis of two components. The first component is attendance, participation in group discussion and submission of in-class writing assignments, in-

class submission of reading questions. The second component is the submission of a statement of your goals and aspirations for your own participation (e.g. attend all classes, speak up at least once a week) due by September 29, and the submission of a reflection at the end of the semester on how well you achieved your goals, due on December 8th.

- This assignment is aimed at two learning outcomes: the ability to engage in constructive, respectful oral argumentation; the ability to reflectively engage in your own learning process
- Missing participation may not be made up

Three tests: 24% (October 13, November 8, December 8)

- The tests will be in two parts: an in-class test consisting of short answer questions (closed book) and a multiple choice section to be completed at home on D2L prior to writing the in-class portion.
- This assignment is aimed at two learning outcomes: broad knowledge of diverse views about sex, love and death; ability to critically understand and articulate key concepts
- Missed tests will require a documented medical reason in order to be allowed a make-up test.

Five short papers: 50% (Due October 2, October 23, November 6, November 20 and December 4)

- The short assignments require you to articulate a concept or view (yours or others) in a clear and coherently constructed way. Part of your tutorials will focus on learning how to write a short paper.
- You will be graded on the basis of both writing and content.

- Short assignments are to be handed in at the end of class or in the drop-box in the philosophy department, 12th floor Social Sciences prior to 4 pm on the due date.
- Late assignments may be handed in late with a reasonable excuse. Late assignments without prior permission will be penalized at the rate of one letter grade per day.
