# **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to some of the philosophical theories and arguments of the Presocratic Philosophers, Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, the Sceptics, Stoics and Epicureans. We will critically examine and discuss their views on topics in metaphysics, science, epistemology, psychology and ethics.
