COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will examine a number of controversial ethical topics associated with information technology including Privacy, Intellectual Property, Freedom of Expression and Censorship, and Virtual Reality.

PREREQUISITES: None

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The general aims of the course are to have students acquire the ability to distinguish and appreciate the core ethical associated with information technology, the ability to identify philosophical reasoning, particularly to recognize, extract, and evaluate arguments, and finally, the ability to research and write philosophical exams and essays that have plausible theses and reasonable supporting arguments.

COURSE ASSESSMENT

This course will be graded using a "contract system" designed to give students maximum control over their own grades.

- 1. 3 short essay exams (to be taken on D2L).
- 2. 3 paper assignments (4-6 pages each).

Note: a pass or "P" = 70% or above available point credit for an assignment.

- To achieve a D in the class, students must complete all three essay exams satisfactorily (P/F).
- To achieve a C in the class, students must complete all three essay exams satisfactorily (P/F) and complete one paper satisfactorily (P/F).
- To achieve a B in the class, students must complete all three essay exams satisfactorily (P/F) and complete two papers satisfactorily (P/F)
- To achieve an A in the class, students must complete all three essay exams satisfactorily (P/F) and complete three papers satisfactorily (P/F).

"Plusses" and "Minuses" are determined as a function of student class participation. This is necessarily a somewhat intangible grading factor. But the more you contribute to conversation, the more brownie points you get. The less you contribute, the fewer brownie points you get. This includes class presentations, which will consist in short summary oral reports on the readings. I expect a maximum of two such summaries per student.

There is no final exam. Computers are allowed in class. All course work is to be submitted through D2L. Late or missing work is only allowed with advance permission from the professor.
