Course Description

This course examines philosophical issues associated with a conception of God common to the three major monotheistic religions. It begins with traditional and recent arguments for the existence of God. It then turns to a discussion of the attributes of God, and the relation between religion and morality. Next we discuss the problem of evil. And in the final part of the course we discuss the relation between theism and rationality.

Course Objectives

Throughout the course you will be attempting to come to your own conclusions regarding the issues discussed by assessing arguments for and against the views presented in the readings. You will be developing your ability to comprehend, interpret, and analyse complex sources, as well as to recognise and construct convincing arguments both in writing and orally.

Course Requirements

A take-home midterm due Oct 9 worth 15% of final grade, two papers 1500-1800 words due Oct 30 and Dec 1 each worth 30% of the final grade, and a take-home final exam due Dec 12 worth 25% of the final grade.

All assignments are due 4 pm in the course drop box opposite my office. Late assignments will be marked down by one grade step, e.g. from a B to a B-, for each day of lateness. (The time between Fri and Mon counts as one day.) If you are anticipating any difficulty in turning your assignment in on time you must discuss the problem with me before the due date.

I shall be using D2L to post readings, assignments and grades, to confirm what we are reading for the next lecture, and to provide some questions on those readings. All grades are assigned using a letter scale.
