Course Description

This course will provide an introduction to Asian philosophy including thought emerging out of Hindu, Buddhist and Chinese philosophies. We will explore how modes of thinking in the "East" differ from traditional Western approaches. Examples of topics to be included are dharma, karma, dependent co-arising, suffering, nothingness, the Dao, ritual, the sage and ethics.
