COURSE INFORMATION

In this course we will study contributions to philosophy in the Existentialist tradition made by Søren Kierkegaard, Jean-Paul Sartre, Simone de Beauvoir and (to a lesser extent) Martin Heidegger.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Knowledge of core ideas of Kierkegaard, Sartre, de Beauvoir.
- Understanding the distinction between existentialism and essentialism.
- A grasp of how the existentialist tradition fits with other schools of philosophy.
- Ability to critically digest, interpret, and analyze philosophical writings of enduring value.
- Ability to write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions.
- An enhanced ability to think through philosophical issues.
