Course Description

Many people think that we need to engage with evidence against our beliefs. But there are times when doing so can seem unnecessary and even wrong. We'll consider arguments that evidence should guide all our beliefs, as well as arguments that sometimes we can and even should ignore evidence that's presented to us. In the second half of the course, we'll look at two areas in which these issues become pressing: conspiracy theories and psychic phenomena.
