#### **Course Description**

This course will be an investigation of the nature and role of evidence both in science and in everyday life. Some of the questions we will consider are: What is evidence? Is evidence the same thing as information or data? Is it objective? What is the role of evidence in science/medicine/policy?

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

- 1. Describe the position argued for by a particular author or set of authors regarding the nature and role of evidence.
- 2. Compare different positions on the nature and role of evidence.
- 3. Discuss and critically evaluate existing literature on the nature and role of evidence.
- 4. Develop a case study of the nature of role played by evidence in the context of a specific problem.
