COURSE INFORMATION:

Many people think that we need to engage with evidence against our beliefs. But there are times when doing so can seem unnecessary and even wrong. We'll consider arguments that evidence should guide all our beliefs, as well as arguments that sometimes we can and even should ignore evidence that's presented to us. We'll close by looking at view about the evidence provided by the study of conspiracy theories.
