### **Course Description**

Among the many sorts of moral appraisal are appraisals of moral blameworthiness and moral praiseworthiness, or briefly, appraisals of moral responsibility. It is widely believed that the truth of such appraisals presupposes freedom. For example, an agent cannot be blameworthy for doing something unless she did it freely. In this course, we will explore central, proposed accounts of the freedom responsibility requires. We will also discuss the issue of whether responsibility is important or valuable.

#### Required Texts

Text: *Incompatibilism's Allure: Principal Arguments of Incompatibilism*, by Ish Haji. Students will be supplied with a list of papers. Each of these papers is available online in journals or in other venues to which our University Library subscribes. Links to the papers will be posted on D2L.

#### **Evaluation**

- (1) Three (final) essays. The first (4-5 page) paper will be worth 30% of the final grade. The second and third (4-5 page) papers will each be worth 35% of the final grade. Writing and the grading thereof is a factor in evaluation. Writing should be clear, coherent, and to the point.
- (2) Three Rough Drafts: for each essay you will write a (1-2 page) draft which will be reviewed by at least one of your classmates. Some of you may have your drafts workshopped by the class as a whole. These drafts are not graded, although a missing draft will reduce the grade of your final corresponding essay. (See the policy on late assignments below.)

# **Tentative Assignment Dates:**

First essay draft: Friday, Oct. 2. First (final) essay: Friday, Oct. 9. Second essay draft: Friday, Oct. 30. Second (final) essay: Friday, Nov. 6. Third essay draft: Monday, Nov. 30. Third (final) essay: Monday, Dec. 7.

(3) Class Participation: you are expected to be an active participant in class discussions. Read the course material and have questions and comments ready.

- (4) There will be no Registrar-scheduled final exam.
- (5) There will be *no* provisions for "extra-credit." A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a pass in the course as a whole.

## **Grading Method**

Each paper will be assigned a letter grade. The student's overall grade for the course will be an average of the student's letter grades on the student's papers. Letter grades will be averaged by using GPA numerical equivalents as outlined in the University Calendar.

## Policy on Late Assignments

No unexcused late final essays or drafts will be accepted without official and adequate documentation. Missing final essays will receive an "F" (a numerical score of zero). Each missing essay draft will reduce the grade of the final corresponding essay by two whole letter grades.
