### **Course Description**

Philosophical problems and ideas are often motivated with hypothetical scenarios. Because philosophical writing often leaves those scenarios underdescribed, it can sometimes be hard to relate to those problems or understand why they're philosophically important. Films can help remedy this difficulty by presenting philosophically rich scenarios in vivid and compelling detail. In this course we will look at a selection of films (and a couple of television episodes) that dramatize philosophical problems. In particular, we will focus on issues in the philosophy of evidence and knowledge (epistemology), the nature of right and wrong (ethics), how punishment is justified, and what it is to lead a good life.

- Ability to critically digest, interpret, and analyze complex sources;
- Ability to write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions;
