Course Description

The topic of the course is the relationship of philosophy with the unknown. Themes to be considered include thinking and being, knowledge and non-knowledge, the human and the non-human, philosophy and non-philosophy, the "known" and its potential victims. Although some consideration will be given in the classes to historical context and to philosophical predecessors and successors, both the classes and the assignments will focus on the arguments in the four selected texts.

- **4.** François Laruelle, *General Theory of Victims*. Trans. Alex Dubilet and Jessie Hock (Polity Press, 2015).

Course Requirements

- 1. First essay: 2000 words. Due on **Oct. 27**; worth 40% of final grade.
- 2. Second essay: 2000 words. Due on **Dec.11** (in the dept. drop-box); worth 40% of final grade.
- 3. In-class presentation: 1000 words. Worth 10% of final grade.
- 4. Class Participation: Worth 10% of final grade. (This grade will be based on constructive contributions to class discussions.)

There will be no Registrar-scheduled final exam.

Letter grades will be given. Those grades will be based on the following numerical system: A = 90-100%; A = 85-89%; A = 80-84%; B + = 77-79; B = 74-76; B - = 70-73; C + = 67-69; C = 64-66; C - = 60-63; D + = 55-59; D = 50-54; F = 0-49. If the final grade is fractional, it will be rounded off to the higher full number only if it is .5 or higher (e.g. 69.5 would become 70, 69.49 would not).

Late papers will receive a grade reduction (A to A-, A- to B+, and so on) unless an extension has been negotiated before the deadline. A paper submitted after an extended deadline will be subject to the same policy of grade reduction. No papers will be accepted after the final grades have been submitted to the Department and the Registrar.

Please hand two paper copies of each of your essays directly to me (unless instructed to slip them under my office door or in the drop-box available in the Philosophy department on the 12th floor of the Social Science Building). Ensure that you have a copy. **Papers submitted by email will** *not* **be accepted.**
