**Course Description**

This course will be an investigation of the role of values in science. We will first examine the connection between values and objectivity. We will then look at the roles of diversity, consensus, and scientific expertise. Finally, we will consider how frameworks for scientific decision making under uncertainty reflect these concerns. Students will work throughout this course to develop a case study of a particular scientific problem and the role or impact of values in this context.

**Prerequisites:**

Two previous courses in Philosophy one of which be Philosophy 275, 279 or 377 and one of which must be Philosophy 201 or 395.

**Course Learning Outcomes**

1. Describe the position argued for by a particular author or set of authors regarding values and objectivity in science.
2. Compare different positions on values and objectivity in science.
3. Discuss and critically evaluate existing literature values and objectivity in science.
4. Develop a case study of the role played by values in the context of a specific scientific problem.
