Course Description

The course, in conjunction with your Honours Supervisor, will guide you through the development of an idea for your Honours Thesis, the preparation of a project description and bibliography, and the presentation of your project to the rest of the class.

Evaluation

- Project presentation, to be conducted in one of 5 class meetings from November 7th through December 5th, worth 20% of the grade.
- Reading presentation, to be conducted in one of 4 class meetings from October 3^{rd} through October 31^{st} , worth 20% of the grade.
- Initial project description and bibliography, due October 3rd, worth 10% of the grade.
- Final project description and bibliography, due December 12th, worth 30% of the grade.
- Progress on thesis project, as determined by consultation with thesis supervisor, worth 20% of the grade.
- There will NOT be a Registrar-scheduled final exam.

INTELLECTUAL HONESTY

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. As a result, cheating or plagiarism on any assignment or examination is regarded as **an extremely serious academic offence**, the penalty for which may be an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. The University Calendar states that plagiarism exists when:

- the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test;
- parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source; and/or
- a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted. Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement, but also when original

ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodation.
