Additional Information

This class will involve attendance at arts events and research meetings both on and off campus.

Our main classroom is SS105, but we have a dedicated research room in the Taylor Family Digital Library (440A) where we will meet with our special support team – usually during Wednesday classes.

Course Description

From the calendar: An introduction to a variety of perspectives on human culture. Students will inquire into such topics as the nature of discovery and creation, tradition and modernity, gender and social structure. These topics will be approached through careful analysis of artistic, literary, religious, philosophical and scientific texts.

This year, our *quest* will be to about what it means to build a better city, and our *questions* will engage ten key areas that will help us pursue that quest. After a detailed reading of *Plato's Republic*, we will explore an anthology that combines research from a variety of areas and begin an ongoing program of work at the library with a series of subject specialists under the guidance of our course-specific specialist Rosvita Vaska.

Special guests will come to the class to present us with three areas each that require investigation and which will frame our questions. Our guests come from a variety of important areas in our city. Guests will include the president of the University of Calgary, representatives from the Mayor's Office, the president of The Chamber of Commerce, the heads of the United Way and the Calgary Foundation, a senior Economist from ATB Financial, medical experts, artists and scientists and more.

Our work will take inspiration from Plato's early questions about how to build a better city and combine it with our own explorations of Calgary. At the end of the year, we will compile our findings in a document that will be formally launched to the community and shared with key stakeholders throughout the city.

Objectives of the Course

- Learn multiple methods of research;
- Learn that research is a living practice that serves our community
- Develop skills that will allow students to initiate and support their own research in the future
- Develop skills that will allow students to understand how to get the results of their research into the hands of key stakeholders
- Think big, work hard and improve our world

- 3. **Research Project**: including ongoing research (15%), documentation (10%) and final presentation (30%): 55%
