Course Description

This course is an introduction to moral theory. We will be looking at both classic and contemporary writers' answers to questions such as: Why should people be moral? What distinguishes right actions from wrong ones? What distinguishes good persons from bad ones? You will learn to read difficult philosophical texts carefully and analytically, and to write about them in ways that demonstrate clear critical understanding of what you've read.

Required Texts

All texts are available online and can be downloaded either directly from the course Blackboard website or from websites that will be linked to Blackboard.

Evaluation

Grades are determined by performance in the following five areas. Writing and the grading thereof is a factor in the evaluation of your work for this course.

- 1. Three Study Question Assignments. (10% of the course grade)
 Each of the three study question assignments will consist of three questions relating to the assigned texts. Study question assignments are due before the beginning of class on the following days and are to be submitted via the "Study Question Assignments" section on Blackboard: September 13th, September 20th, and September 27th.
- 2. Two short essay assignments. (35% of the course grade)

 These essays—due October 7th (15% of the course grade) and November 22nd (20% of the course grade)—will consist of your responses to questions that will be distributed to you at least two weeks before the essays are due. Each essay should be between three and four pages in length.

- 3. One in-class midterm exam (20% of the course grade)
 The midterm exam—which will take place on November 1st—will consist of short concept identification questions and short essay questions.
- 4. Take-home Final Exam. (20% of the course grade)

 The open-book final exam—to be submitted via Blackboard by 11:59 pm on December 9th—will consist of a mixture of short concept identification questions and short essay questions.

 There is no Registrar scheduled final exam.
- 5. Class Participation. (15% of the course grade)

Participation during lectures is encouraged. Five percent (5%) of the course grade will be based upon in-class responses, via Top Hat, to instructor questions. To successfully earn this portion of the grade, students must respond (with correct or incorrect answers) to at least 80% of the (approximately 50) Top Hat questions asked during the semester's lectures. Answering less than 80% of the questions will result in a proportionately lower grade. Instructions for Top Hat, as well as accomodations for students who do not regularly bring the requisite cell phones or portable computers to class, will be discussed during the first week of class. Attendance and participation during tutorials is also encouraged. Ten percent (10%) of the course grade will be based upon your contributions to your tutorial. This grade is determined by your tutor. The tutor will provide, in writing, more information about his expectations for your contributions on or before the first tutorial session.

Students on the borderline of two grades will be bumped up only if they have completed all assignments and if the final exam reflects the higher score.

Late Study Question Assignments will not be accepted and exams cannot be taken late, except in the event of a personal emergency. Short essays will be penalized by ten percentage points for each day they are late, except in the event of a personal emergency.
