Course Description

Philosophical explorations of sex, love and death focusing on questions of definition, interpretation, and significance.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Broad knowledge of diverse approaches to the philosophy of sex, love, and death.
- Detailed knowledge of Plato's Symposium.
- Ability to critically digest, interpret, and analyze complex sources.
- Ability to write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions.
- Ability to connect theoretical perspectives on sex love, and death to various practical social issues and phenomena: e.g., polygamy, gender identity, sexual behaviour, euthanasia etc.
