### **COURSE INFORMATION**

When a physician and a patient disagree over a certain course of medical treatment, who should ultimately decide? What is informed consent and why is it so important? What makes clinical trials ethical? Medical professionals, patients, and their loved ones are routinely confronted with ethical challenges within a healthcare setting. Bioethics is a relatively new discipline that aims to understand and address these challenges. We will begin by considering the theoretical foundations of bioethics and the complexity of moral reasoning within a medical setting. From there, we will consider some of the central ethical issues within a medical context, including how to maintain and uphold the well-being and dignity of patients, autonomous decision-making, the rights and responsibilities of medical professionals, patients, and their loved ones, and justice and fairness in healthcare. This course is intended for philosophy students, as well as those considering a career in health sciences.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify what constitutes an ethical issue in a healthcare setting
- Comprehend the complexity of ethical reasoning within a healthcare setting
- Apply ethical reasoning to a clinical ethics case study
- Appreciate the importance of clinical ethics within a healthcare setting
- Ability to write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions
- Ability to engage in constructive, respectful, oral and written argumentation

### REQUIRED/RECOMMENDED TEXTBOOKS, READINGS AND MATERIALS

There is no required textbook. All readings are available online or will be posted on D2L.

This course will be delivered exclusively online, using Zoom and D2L. Each Monday, I will post two recorded lectures on D2L, which you may watch at any time, by Thursday of that week. On Thursday

afternoon, 1-2:00 p.m., I will hold a drop-in Zoom meeting, in which students may raise questions about course material discussed in the lecture recordings or about course requirements. While this drop-in meeting is not mandatory, nor is this component graded, I strongly recommend that students take advantage of this time for help with the course and to interact with myself, the TA, and other students.

Precis: A précis is a short paper (750 words or less) that has two main aims. The first is to distill a philosopher's argument in an article to its essential elements. The second aim is to provide a short critical response to this argument. Students may choose from the assigned articles and may choose when they wish to submit them. However, one must be submitted between weeks 2-4, and one must be submitted between weeks 5-7. Both should be submitted to D2L.

Case study position paper: Students will be required to complete one case study position paper on a bioethical case study, which I will assign. Students will be expected to develop an argument (750 words maximum) explaining their position on their case study. This position paper will be posted on a D2L Discussion Board.

Responses to case studies: Students will be required to complete two responses to two different case studies position papers posted on D2L. Each response will be 500 words maximum. All responses should be posted on D2L.

Paper: The paper will 1500-2000 words maximum, double-spaced, in 12-point font, with 2.54cm margins. Papers should provide a clear thesis statement, exposition on a philosopher's position, and an argument in response to this position. I will provide topics. All papers should be submitted to D2L.

There is no registrar scheduled final exam for this course.

### **Course policies**

Late assignments: Late assignments will be accepted, but will be penalized 2%/day. In order to avoid penalty, students must provide written documentation explaining why an assignment was late.

There will be no "extra-credit" assignments available to any student for any reason.
