Environmental Ethics for Canadians. Byron Williston (2012), Oxford University Press.

Course Description:

This course introduces students to the central concepts and theories of environmental ethics. We will explore questions such: What is the source of moral value? What kinds of beings deserve moral standing? How should economic and practical considerations be balanced against our responsibility to the environment? Subjects include:

- 1. Ethical Theories and Moral Standing
- 2. Theoretical Approaches to Environmental Ethics
- 3. Economic and Practical Constraints on Ethical Duties
- 4. Case Studies in Environmental Sciences

Evaluation and Grading:

• Four short papers (1000 words max) will be worth 40% of the final grade (10% each). Students may write a paper one any ONE of the assigned articles, but they must be turned in **BEFORE** in-class discussion of the piece. In addition, two papers must be turned in before the midterm exam and two after the midterm so that students complete two in each half of the course.

Evaluation and Grading (continued):

- An in-class midterm on **June 5** will be worth 30% of the final grade.
- A (somewhat scripted) debate: Class time will be sets aside for students to work in groups to produce a debate on some ethical issue discussed in class. Grades will be based on both the quality of the arguments produced, and an evaluation of each student's individual contribution from fellow group members. Regular attendance is therefore advised. The debates will take place June 24 and 26, and will be worth 30% of the final grade.
- There is no Registrar-scheduled final exam.
- Students may, in principle, fail any one of these components and still pass the course.
