

PHIL 347 Lec 01 "Contemporary Moral Problems" Fall Term 2019

Course Description

In this course, we will review and evaluate debates around contemporary moral issues. Topics include: genetic enhancement, pornography, performance-enhancing drugs, world poverty, grown children's obligations to parents, and others.

Important Note

This course is entirely online, with the exception of the midterm and final, both of which must be taken on campus on the date scheduled. The tentative time and date for the midterm is Saturday, Oct. 19, from 3-5 p.m. The final exam will be registrar-scheduled.

The marks on these sample exams will not count toward your final grade, but they will help you assess your level of preparation before the midterm. ***
