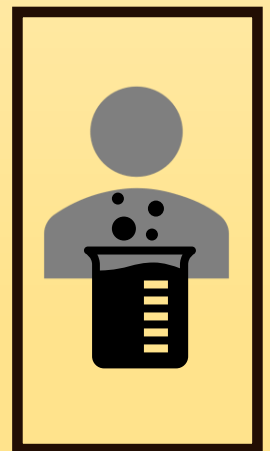

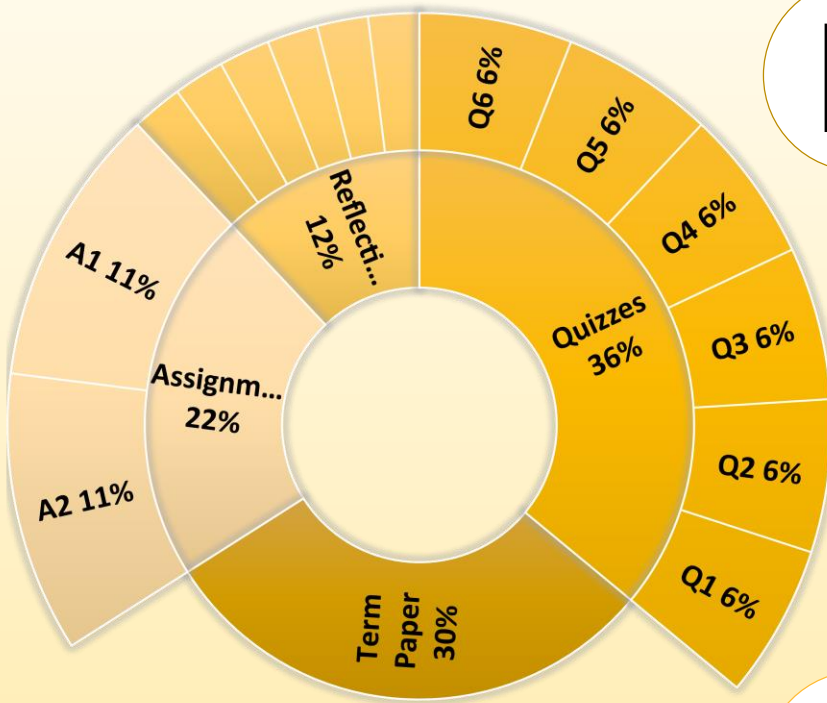

There will be short online quizzes (worth 6% each) available at the end of class Wednesdays and due before e next Monday

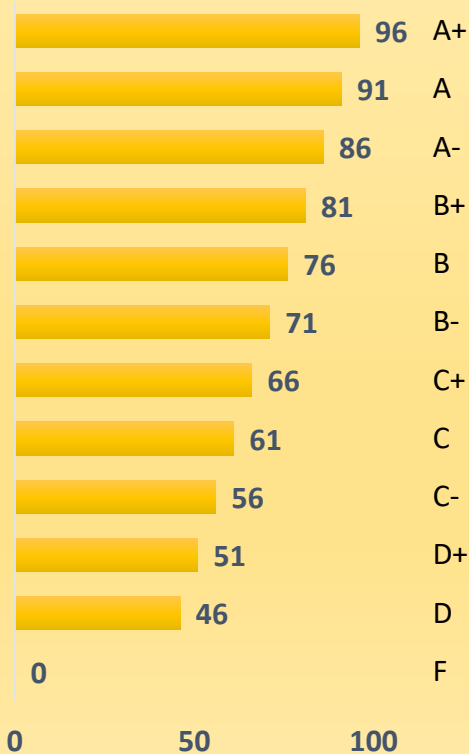


There will also be a term paper (worth 30%) due the last day of class
