**COURSE INFORMATION**

In this course we will examine issues in metaphysics. We will examine hypotheses concerning innate concepts, the self, physical substance and intentionality.

**Course Learning Outcomes**

This course aims to develop the capacity to carefully evaluate metaphysical theories. As part of this process students will be given the opportunity to develop their ability to produce clear written summaries of positions and arguments proposed by these theorists and to produce thoughtful assessments of these proposals

**PREREQUISITE(S)**

Two previous courses in philosophy, at least one of which must be a 300 or higher level course and one of which must be 201 or 395; or consent of the Department.

**Required/Recommended Texts (including electronic resources):**

Readings will be indicated via the D2L site for this class.

**Course Assessment**

The final grade will be determined by three take-home tests. The take-home tests will be posted on D2L and they will be submitted on D2L using Dropbox. Each test should be a single PDF or Word file. Please make sure that your file is less than 3 MB. Please make sure to take a screenshot of the D2L page when submitting your test. The tests involve writing essays on assigned topics. Late take-home tests will be assigned a grade of zero unless a university approved justification is provided prior to the test being posted.
