Course Description

In this course, we undertake a detailed investigation of some central normative ethical theories, such as utilitarianism and Kantianism. Various accounts of goodness, for example, hedonism and preferentism, will be discussed as well. We will also examine topics on free will and responsibility.

Prerequisites

Two previous philosophy courses at least one of which must be at the 300 level or higher and one of which must be either 249 or 397; or consent of the department.

Course Learning Outcomes

Students should be able to:

1. Explain key ethical concepts, such as being obligatory, being intrinsically good, being supererogatory, being a prima facie duty, and being morally responsible.
2. Critically analyze philosophical texts on central normative ethical theories, such as utilitarianism, Kant’s deontology, or Ross’ pluralism.
3. Acquire in depth knowledge of central normative ethical theories.
4. Write a convincing argument for or against fundamental issues in ethics to be discussed, such as whether motives are relevant to obligation or whether hedonistic accounts are plausible accounts of personal welfare.
5. Engage in constructive oral argumentation regarding relevant concepts, principles, or theories introduced in the course.

Required Texts (including electronic resources)

Students will be supplied with a list of papers or book chapters. Each of these is available online in journals or in other venues to which our University Library subscribes. Links to the papers or chapters will be posted on D2L.

Course Assessment

(1) Three 4-5-page final papers, each worth 30% of the final grade. Writing and the grading thereof is a factor in evaluation. Writing should be clear, coherent, and to the point.

(2) Three Rough Drafts: For each paper you will write a one-page draft. At least one of your classmates and I will review this draft. Some of you may have your drafts workshopped by the class as a whole. These drafts are not graded, although a missing draft will reduce the grade of your final corresponding paper. (See the policy on late assignments below.)

(3) Seminar participation worth 10% of the final grade: You are expected to be an active participant in seminar (including draft-essay) discussions. Read the course material and have questions and comments ready. You cannot participate if you are not present. You are allowed naught (0) unexcused absences. Official and adequate documentation is required to justify an absence. For each unexcused absence, your grade for the next final paper that is due will be reduced by one full letter grade.

(4) There will be no Registrar-scheduled final exam.

(5) There will be no provisions for "extra-credit." A passing grade on any particular component of the course is not required for a pass in the course as a whole.

Grading Method

Each paper will be assigned a letter grade. You will also receive a letter grade for your participation. Your overall grade for the course will be an average of your letter grades on your papers and participation. Letter grades will be averaged by using the following scheme.

Conversion of Number Grades into Letter Grades

A+ = 100-96; A = 95-90; A- = 89-85; B+ = 84-80; B = 79-75; B- = 74-71; C+ = 70-67; C = 66-62; C- = 61-59; D+ = 58-54; D = 53-50; F = 49-0.

Policy on Late Assignments

No unexcused late final essays or drafts will be accepted without official and adequate documentation. Missing final essays will receive an "F" (a numerical score of zero). Each missing draft essay will reduce the grade of the final corresponding essay by two whole letter grades.
