Course Description

This course will look at the politics of our production, regulation and consumption of food. The course will pair core readings in political philosophy (property, distribution, critique of capitalism, liberty and paternalism, gender, class and race inequality) with issues about the production, regulation and consumption of food. Topics to be covered include food insecurity, food sovereignty and food waste (property rights and distribution); food production (gender, race, class, property rights, distribution); and food regulation (liberty and paternalism). Our discussions on these issues will also look at food discourse including obesity discourse and alternative food discourse (class, gender and race).

Course Learning Outcomes

- Understanding of some foundational issues in political philosophy and how these relate to our production, regulation and consumption of food
- Ability to write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions;
- Ability to engage in constructive, respectful, oral and written argumentation.

Course Assessment

- Weekly Questions 20%
 - Each week you are required to submit one or more questions on the reading—the questions should indicate to me that you have done the reading carefully enough to be philosophically puzzled or confused by it. These are to be handed in on index cards at the beginning of the class and will help to structure the class discussion. You may skip two weeks for a total of 10. These are graded Pass/Fail
- Participation 10%
 - You are expected to expand on your weekly questions as well as take part regularly in class discussions. Good participation requires not only contributing but also interacting respectfully with others which requires attentive listening and responsiveness to others as well as giving others space to contribute.

- Two short papers (1500-1800 words). 20%
 - Due February 1 and March 8. Late papers will 4 points per day in the absence of an appropriate reason for lateness.
 - You may substitute an activity assignment (see PHIL 553.4 course outline) for one or both papers. In the case of a substitution due dates will depend on the activity chosen.

- Final paper 50%
 - The final paper is due Monday April 17. You may submit electronically or you may bring me the paper in my office during my office hours (3-4:30).
 - A draft of the paper is due by Friday March 31. The grad students and I will then meet to discuss the drafts.
 - Late papers will be penalized 4 points per day in the absence of an appropriate reason for lateness.
